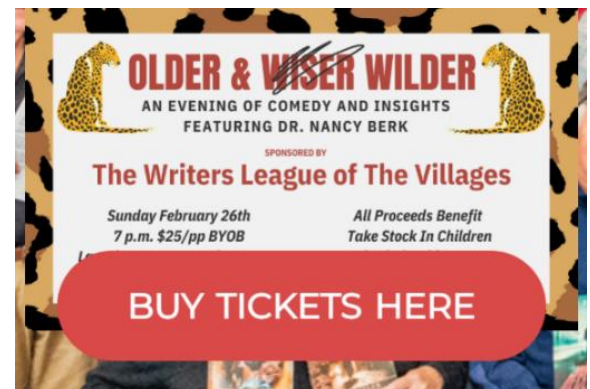

Message From Your President

CONNECTION. If you missed the WLOV December 14th Christmas party, you missed a good one. We had ten new members join the club and an almost equal number of new books announced. It was impossible not to be impressed as each new member stood up to introduce themselves and share their background and their writing experience.

The same thing was true as other members introduced their newly-published books. After months, sometimes years of effort, here they were announcing that their dream was finally realized – their book was now published and available for all the world to see. Topping the session off, game show maestro Ric Mitchell hosted over an hour of his famous juke box trivia game activities. The loud music, sound effects, and fierce competition had groups cheering, hooting and hollering as their table beat others in buzzing in with correct answers to book and musical trivia questions. As host of our monthly meetings, it’s my job to manage the agenda. One of the activities I had to drop from the schedule due to time constraints was a small group exercise to reflect on all that we have to be grateful for. We seat members at tables during meetings to promote person-to-person and small group interactions. I had planned to set aside 10 minutes for people to talk to the other people at their table about what was going right in their lives, our Villages community, and our country. We would have followed that up with about 5 minutes of full group sharing of the results of those discussions. In total, we would have spent about 15 minutes reminding ourselves of all the good things that we have in our lives – especially those of us lucky enough to live here in The Villages.

While we didn’t have time for this exercise, I felt that the goals of the exercise had been fully met. There are three main goals for WLOV: education, promotion, and networking. Teaching people to become better writers and promote and sell their books are easily understood and measurable goals. Networking, however, is more ephemeral.

How do you measure the benefits of getting to hang out with other people like you who are interested in writing and literature? For me, it’s one of those “I know it when I see it” things. At the end our December meeting, people were jazzed up, laughing, smiling, shaking hands, hugging each other and genuinely wishing each other a Merry Christmas as they were leaving the meeting room. There was a sense of connection that was tangible and heartwarming.

Few of the people who live in The Villages today grew up here. What's left of our families and the people we knew in the earlier parts of our life are now physically far away from this place where we spend our days. That makes the sense of connection with others that groups like WLOV provide even more important at this stage of our lives.

I suppose we could evaluate how well WLOV is doing as a club by tracking membership growth, the number of awards won by members, or other "hard" metrics. Truly though, for me, providing a place where people can find an intellectual, emotional, and spiritual home with other "birds of a feather" like themselves will always be one of WLOV's most important missions. It's certainly one of the things that I will be giving thanks for during my tenure. I hope you feel that way about our club too!

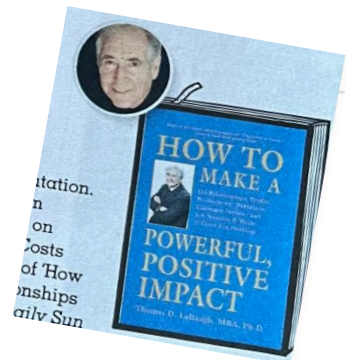

FEATURED SPEAKERS


We have booked three excellent speakers to help attract attendees:

The Oxford Comma

Which is correct?

- **I’m going to need eggs, flour, butter, and chocolate chips for the cookies.**
- **I’m going to need eggs, flour, butter and chocolate chips for the cookies.**

The correct punctuation is the Oxford comma in the first sentence. The Oxford comma comes before the “and” in a list of things.

Also known as the “serial comma,” the Oxford comma is the sometimes-optional final comma in a list of things. For example, the comma after “milk” in the below sentence:

Gordon bought bread, milk, and eggs at the grocery store.

Some style guides insist on the Oxford comma, and others think it’s no big deal. But, neglecting to use it can lead to some serious misunderstandings.

I’m having breakfast with my parents, Beyonce and Jay-Z.

The lack of an Oxford comma in this sentence makes its meaning ambiguous. Is the speaker having breakfast with four people — Mom, Dad, Beyonce, and Jay-Z? Or are their parents actually Beyonce and Jay-Z? Inquiring minds want to know. A final comma in the series would clear up the confusion.

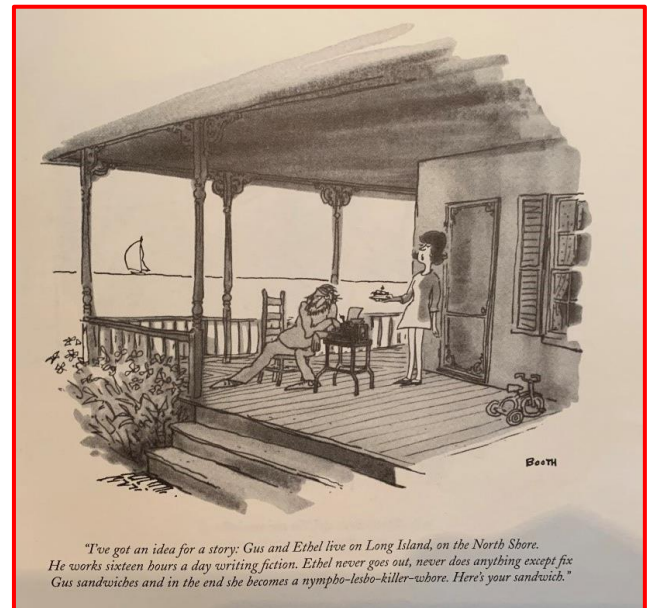
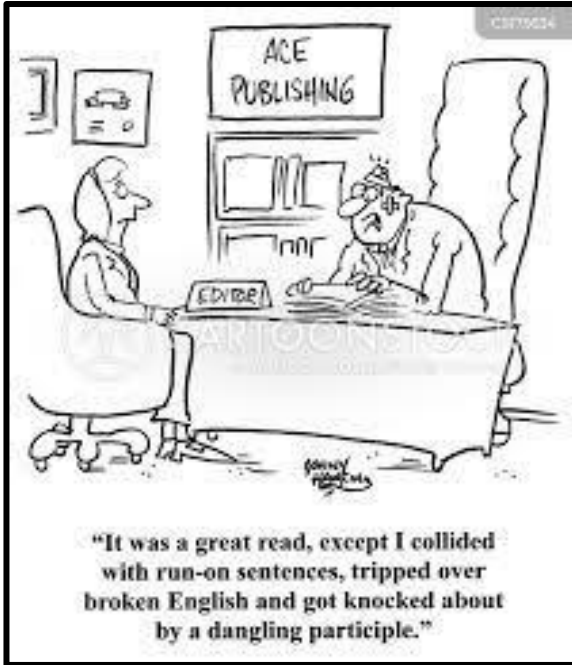
I get this type of scam email 2-3x/week. Sometimes it’s a fake renewal to Geek Squad, but more commonly to Norton. In this one:

WLOV Authors-Dates-Books Featured in The Villages Magazine

Starting in January 2019, WLOV began a special relationship with The Villages Magazine to have an author and his/her book featured in the *Villages Author Spotlight* section on the Book Lovers Corner page. Member Dan Kincaid has coordinated this effort for WLOV for the past four years by collecting information from the authors and submitting it to the magazine.

The submissions include the book cover, an author headshot, and a short Q&A write-up. We have successfully been featured 43 times over the past four years. Occasionally, the magazine editors decline to use one of our submissions for what they term as an “editorial decision” and occasionally we get pre-empted by a book that one of their editors has chosen from another source. But we have largely been successful in getting our authors featured.

Dan keeps a file of those who have sent their required information to him and he selects an author at random to submit each month. These are then submitted to the magazine approximately two months prior to publication date.

This has been another one of the successful efforts by WLOV to help publicize our members and their books. Thanks to everyone who has participated and to Dan for his efforts in coordinating this project for our club. Below is the list of authors and their books featured to date.
