President's Message: Writing The Book is Only the Beginning

You work and work and work. You refine and refine and refine. You persevere through days of triumph and days of agony. Some days you marvel at how well it's going. Other days you despair of ever finishing. But somehow, someway, against all odds – you finish. It's done. This is it. You've written the book. You've crossed the finish line. Hurray! Wait! What? What do you mean that was only the beginning?

* * * * *

Welcome to the world of self-publishing on Amazon. We have several internationally recognized award-winning authors in the club. They know all the tricks of the trade to self-publishing on Amazon. However, we also have a lot of members who—like me—are working on their first book.

If you haven't gone through the process of self-publishing on Amazon, I think it would be valuable to hear a little more about it before you start. So, in my President's message this month, I am going to share with you my "newbie" experience recently launching my first book.

I have a family website that I use to chronicle our many activities. It was a central part of my book launch plan. I created a dedicated webpage for the book launch. I compiled a list of almost 200 friends and acquaintances that I notified about the upcoming launch of my book.


I developed a free 45-page sample of the book that people could download in advance of and after publication to see what my book was about. I begged shamelessly and ceaselessly for people to post reviews on Amazon. (If you want to see my book launch site, go to https://frankalancione.com/sunset-years-book.)

In parallel with all of that, I completed numerous tutorials on how to publish on Amazon. This is critical because you need to understand that it is not at all a straightforward process. Amazon is e-commerce and its interface to the customer is a database. This means you must master the art of search engine optimization to compete effectively within the Amazon marketplace.

Think about the way that you do a search online. You type in a key word and look typically at the first and maybe the second page of results that appear. There may be wonderful options awaiting you on pages three and beyond, but you rarely scan that far back in the search results to even see them. How well your book does when you sell it through Amazon is heavily dependent on what categories you choose to compete in and what key words you tag your book with.

I relied heavily on author Dave Chesson's Kindlepreneur tutorials and bought his Publisher Rocket software to help me understand what was going on. All his tutorials and tools are available on the internet. According to Chesson, most people buy what they see in the top 10 results returned from their search. Your job is to figure out how to be as close to that range as possible.

Tools like Publisher Rocket help you identify categories that are small enough for you to have a realistic chance of competing in but get enough searches and sales to make it worthwhile to focus your



efforts there. While all of that research is underway, you also have to start advance planning on how to get in front of readers who might be interested in buying your book from you directly. This is where our WLOV club can help. Each month at our general meetings we have sign-up sheets you can use to indicate your interest in participating in our book signings and presentation activities.

My book launch went well for a newbie. In the first three weeks after launch, **Sunset Years** was named an Amazon "#1 Hot New Release" in the American Poetry, Contemporary Poetry, and Poetry Anthologies categories. I consciously decided to compete in these categories because I thought I had a fighting chance there.

Amazon re-ranks every book in a category hourly, so you are lucky to hold that "#1" designation for several days at a time. Even if you only hold it for an hour though, as long as you take a screen shot and can document that you made it, you can now cite it in your advertising.

So, in my case for example, all my advertising for **Sunset Years** going forward says: "Amazon #1 Hot New Release." Oh, and how about my endless, shameless groveling for Amazon reviews? As of today, I have 17 reviews—all five stars. Yes, some are from my friends and fellow authors. However, many are not.

The buzz my friends created with positive early reviews encouraged people I have no connection with to buy the book and review it very favorably. Hearing strangers say that my work resonated with them is priceless and makes all the work involved worthwhile.

Am I done marketing **Sunset Years**? "Heck No!" I'm already working on the next book in the **Sunset Years** series. The best way to make that next book successful is to tie it to a successful first book in the series. That means is that I must keep marketing my first book while I am working on the second. Which, of course, goes to show that the old saying about writing is true: "Writing the book really is only the beginning."



BOOK EXPO2023 – RESULTS ARE IN

Wow! What a day!

After two years of disappointing cancellations due to Covid, Book Expo roared back to life on Sunday, January 29th. Based on criteria used by the Recreation Department, crowd attendance was estimated at between 3,000 and 3,400 people.

I think all of the exhibitors would agree with that estimate. For those of us who have attended many Expos, this was by far the largest crowd. Many exhibitors reported sales of twice their usual amount. Some ran out of books – a good problem to have! Many others made contacts for speaking engagements or other future business activity. All and all – a good day.



We tried a variety of new things with this Expo, and these will continue to be honed going forward. Unfortunately, we had no control over the Rec Center temperature which ranged from moderate, to warm, to meat-locker cold in certain rooms as the day progressed. Don't say I didn't warn you!

The idea of including book genres and table number in the program, while a good one, unfortunately lost something in

translation when folks visited each of the rooms – and failed to find table numbers. We had a huge poster in the lobby which included the room layouts. Unfortunately, most people ignored it. Going forward, we'll have to find a way to post table numbers on the tables.

As always, more volunteers would certainly be a plus – perhaps at each room's entrance - to direct people to a particular author and allow for exhibitor bathroom breaks. Something to work on.

Putting on an event like BookExpo2023 takes a phenomenal amount of planning and coordination. At the risk of leaving someone out (and for this, I apologize!), I want to acknowledge the efforts of a core group of committee members, without whom our success could not have occurred.

A special THANK YOU goes out to the following people:

Susan Dwyer: Strangers Saints and Sinners



searching story wrapped in a blanket of families' sagas, finding truth, forgiveness, and joy.





