## What Happens to Your Royalties When You Die?

You still get royalties from your book sales for seventy years after your death. But where do those royalties go? The bank account registered with the bookseller gets frozen upon your death (assuming it isn't a joint account), but deposits can be entered. But, after probate, the account gets closed.

In the US, royalties go to your heirs. But do your heirs know about all your books and what to do to keep the proceeds of your hard work from going into legal never-never land?

#### Here's what you, the author, can do right now.

- Make a list with the title of your books, your name or pen names, and the ISBN numbers.
- List all the platforms where your book can be bought. Include web address and account numbers. Include your login and password information.
- If you publish through a traditional publisher, list the name, person you deal with, address, and any other pertinent information.
- If you have more than one bank account, make sure you indicate into which account your royalties go.
- File all of this with your estate documents.

#### Here's what your executor needs to do upon your death.

- They will need the following:
  - Death certificate
  - One of the following court-issued letters indicating that you own the rights to the account:
    - Estate Owner
    - Executor
    - Next of kin
    - Will

Then, contact each platform where the author's books are sold and any publisher or agent associated with the author. They will help to close, merge, or take ownership of the account.

**Warning:** DO NOT be tempted to access or change anything in the account(s) of the deceased, even if you have the password(s). This breaches the terms and conditions of the deceased's account(s).

I hope none of our executors need to do this soon, but it is best to be prepared.



When the pair begs Jackie to investigate, she can't say no, although she has no idea where to start or how to solve a mystery other than the ones she writes. Jackie enlists her friends, an African American



Together they squeeze into spandex to invade a high class spa and crash a business conference while still managing to enjoy the delights of Chesapeake Bay. As they interview suspects and delve into the case, they repeatedly run into lead police detective Riley Furman. He thinks Jackie's annoying. She finds him intimidating. In spite of this, the attraction between them can't be denied. It keeps getting stronger even as Jackie and her group of Summer Hill Irregulars move closer to the truth and Riley tries to keep them out of harm's way. As Jackie and her friends edge closer to the identity of the murderer and closer to danger, they learn that the victim wasn't the person they believed her to be and that some family secrets can be deadly.







